

## **SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES:**

### **Putting the Brakes on Health Care Costs:**

*Would the Presidential Candidates' Plans Work?*

*Are There Better Solutions?*

**PAUL GINSBURG** is president of the Center for Studying Health System Change (HSC). Founded in 1995, HSC conducts research to inform policymakers about changes in organization of financing and delivery of care and their effects on people. Affiliated with Mathematica Policy Research, Inc., HSC receives core funding from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Dr. Ginsburg is nationally recognized for his work in health economics and health policy, especially health care market changes and cost trends. He is an advisory board member for the National Institute for Health Care Management. He previously served as executive director of the Physician Payment Review Commission; deputy assistant director of the Congressional Budget Office; senior economist for RAND; a faculty member at Duke and Michigan State Universities; economist with the U.S. Public Health Service; member of the AcademyHealth Board of Directors; and founding member of the National Academy of Social Insurance. In 2007, for the fifth time, Dr. Ginsburg was named by *Modern Healthcare* as one of the 100 most powerful persons in health care. He received the first annual HSR Impact Award from AcademyHealth, the professional association for health policy researchers and analysts. He received his doctorate in economics from Harvard University.

**MARK B. MCCLELLAN** is a senior fellow and director of the Engelberg Center for Healthcare Reform, and Leonard D. Schaeffer Director's Chair in Health Policy at the Brookings Institution. He is a former administrator for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and former commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). While at the FDA and CMS, Dr. McClellan developed and implemented major reforms in health policy, including the Medicare prescription drug benefit, the FDA's Critical Path Initiative, and public-private initiatives to develop better information on the quality and cost of care. His professional experience also includes: associate professor of economics and of medicine at Stanford University; member of the President's Council of Economic Advisers and senior director for health care at the White House; member of the Institute of Medicine; research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research; national fellow at Stanford's Hoover Institution; director of the Program on Health Outcomes Research at Stanford's Center for Health Policy and Center for Primary Care and Outcomes Research; associate editor of the *Journal of Health Economics*; and deputy assistant secretary for economic policy at the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Dr. McClellan holds a Ph.D. in economics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, an M.D. from Harvard University-Massachusetts Institute of Technology Division of Health Sciences and Technology, an M.P.A. from Harvard University and a B.A. from the University of Texas at Austin.

**UWE REINHARDT** is the James Madison Professor of political economy and a professor of economics at Princeton University, where he has taught since 1968. His teaching and research interests have centered primarily on health economics and policy, although he has also written and taught on topics in accounting and finance. Professor Reinhardt has been a consultant to a wide range of business firms and government entities. He is currently president of the International Health Economics Association. In 2006 he was appointed by Governor John Corzine of New Jersey to chair the health reform commission for that state, which released its final report this past February. He has served on the private sector National Leadership Commission on Health Care,

and served for nine years on the Physician Payment Review Commission. He was president of the Association of Health Services Researchers (now AcademyHealth) and is a member of the Institute of Medicine, on whose Governing Council he served. Other groups that have benefited from his membership include: the National Advisory Board of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured; the World Bank External Advisory Panel for Health, Nutrition and Population; the National Institute of Health Care Management; the coordinating committee of the Commonwealth Fund's International Program in Health Policy, which he chairs. Professor Reinhardt received his Ph.D. in economics from Yale University.
