

## SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

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**KATHERINE BAICKER**, PhD, is a professor of health economics in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Harvard School of Public Health. She is a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. From 2005-2007, Professor Baicker served as a Senate-confirmed member of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, where she played a leading role in the development of health policy. She currently serves on the editorial board of Health Affairs, on the board of directors of AcademyHealth, as a commissioner on the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Commission to Build a Healthier America, and on the Institute of Medicine's Committee on Health Insurance Status and Its Consequences. Her research focuses primarily on the factors that drive the distribution, generosity and effectiveness of public and private health insurance, with an emphasis on health insurance finance and the effect of reforms on the distribution and quality of care. Her research has been published in journals such as Health Affairs, the Journal of Public Economics and the Quarterly Journal of Economics. She has been featured in the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, Business Week, and on National Public Radio. She received her B.A. in economics from Yale and her Ph.D. in economics from Harvard.

**SHERRY GLIED** is Professor and Chair in the Department of Health Policy and Management of Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. In 1992-1993, she served as a Senior Economist for health care and labor market policy to the President's Council of Economic Advisers, under President Bush and President Clinton. She was a participant in President Clinton's Health Care Task Force and headed working groups on global budgets and on the economic impacts of the health plan. Her research focuses on health care financing and mental health policy. Her book on health care reform, *Chronic Condition*, was published by Harvard University Press in January 1998. She is co-author (with Richard Frank) of *Better but Not Well: Mental Health Policy in the US Since 1950*, published by Johns Hopkins University Press in July 2006. Professor Glied is a member of the IOM, a member of the board of AcademyHealth, and a research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research. She was the 2004 winner of Research!America's Eugene Garfield Economic Impact of Health Research Award. She is a member of the Congressional Budget Office's Panel of Health Advisers.
