### Network Adequacy: Seeking Balance

**MICHAEL O. LEAVITT** is the founder and chairman of Leavitt Partners, where he advises clients in the health care and food safety sectors. In previous roles, he served in the cabinet of President George W. Bush, as administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency and as secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). At HHS, he administered a \$750 billion budget — nearly 25 percent of the federal budget — and 67,000 employees. He led the implementation of the Medicare Part D prescription drug program. The task required the design, systematization and implementation of a plan to provide 43 million seniors with a new prescription drug benefit. He served as a three-time elected governor of Utah. Gov. Leavitt was elected as chairman of the National Governors Association, the Republican Governors Association and Western Governors' Association. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in business from Southern Utah University. Gov. Leavitt has led U.S. delegations to more than 50 countries. The Chinese government awarded him the China Public Health Award – the first time this award has been given to a government official.

**STEPHANIE M. MOHL** is senior government relations advisor at the American Heart Association (AHA). Her federal advocacy responsibilities include expanding coverage and access, improving the treatment and prevention of stroke, and the elimination of cardiovascular disease disparities in women and minorities. Ms. Mohl is the AHA's lead lobbyist in Washington, DC on health care reform and coordinates its health reform implementation activities. She serves on behalf of the association as a consumer representative to the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. Prior to joining the association, Ms. Mohl worked as a senior legislative assistant in the office of U.S. Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D. for nearly 12 years. Her legislative portfolio for Sen. Dorgan included health care, education, and human services, with a particular emphasis on prescription drug and rural health issues. In April, 2005, *National Journal* named her one of its "Hill 100" for her work on prescription drug issues for Congress. Ms. Mohl graduated magna cum laude from Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C., with a bachelor's degree in political science and a concentration in journalism.

**JOLIE H. MATTHEWS** is senior health and life policy counsel at the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), where she specializes in issues related to health insurance and life insurance. Her responsibilities include staffing the NAIC's Health Insurance & Managed Care Committee. In addition, Ms. Matthews staffs the Regulatory Framework Task Force, which is one of the main task forces within the Health Insurance & Managed Care Committee. Ms. Matthews also is the NAIC lead staff person for the NAIC Life Insurance & Annuities Committee. Prior to joining the NAIC, Ms. Matthews was a senior policy analyst with the Maryland Department of Legislative Services, a non-partisan staffing agency for the Maryland General Assembly, where she served as counsel to the Insurance Committee of the Maryland House of Delegates of the Maryland General Assembly. Ms. Matthews received her undergraduate degree in government and international relations from the University of Notre Dame, a J.D. degree from the University of Maryland School of Law, and an MBA from Loyola University Maryland.

**GRETCHEN JACOBSON** is an associate director with the Kaiser Family Foundation's Program on Medicare Policy where she directs and conducts a variety of projects pertaining to the Medicare program and the population it serves. Prior to joining the Kaiser Family Foundation, Dr. Jacobson was an analyst in health care financing at the Congressional Research Service, serving as an expert resource for Congress; she has also held positions where she directed research on the future market value of pharmaceuticals, medical devices, and health services. Her research has appeared in clinical and policy peer-reviewed journals. Dr. Jacobson received her Ph.D. in health economics from Johns Hopkins School of Public Health and her M.S. in epidemiology from the Harvard School of Public Health.

**STEVEN D. SHAPIRO, MD**, is executive vice president of University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC). He also serves as the president of the Physician Services Division, along with his overarching responsibility as chief medical and scientific officer. Dr. Shapiro works with colleagues across UPMC's integrated delivery and finance system as well as the University of Pittsburgh Schools of the Health Sciences to develop new models of care based upon good science and smart technology with the goal being to provide the highest quality at the least cost. Prior to his move to Pittsburgh, Dr. Shapiro was the Parker B. Francis Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and the chief of the division of pulmonary and critical care at Brigham and Women's Hospital. Dr. Shapiro is the author of over 230 peer-reviewed manuscripts, chapters, and reviews. He served on several editorial boards and advisory committees. He currently serves as a member of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Pulmonary-Allergy Drugs Advisory Committee. Dr. Shapiro obtained his undergraduate and medical degrees from the University of Chicago. He completed an internal medicine residency, chief residency and fellowship in respiratory and critical care at the Washington University School of Medicine. Dr. Shapiro is a physician-scientist who remains active clinically.

**MARC BARCLAY** is the vice president of provider networks and contracting at BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee, which serves more than 3 million members in the state and across the country. In his role, he is responsible for the day-to-day operations associated with provider network contracting. Mr. Barclay looks to further strengthen BlueCross' statewide provider networks with ongoing relationship building efforts. Additionally, he participates in strategic planning across all lines of business at BlueCross. Prior to joining BlueCross, Mr. Barclay served as senior director of regional network management at Centene Corporation, where he was responsible for building provider networks in new expansion markets and negotiating complex provider contracts nationally. He also has network management experience from his time as director of network management for United Healthcare of Tennessee and as director of provider contracting at Humana. Mr. Barclay currently serves on the board of Mending Hearts, a residential recovery community for women in Nashville who are at risk of becoming homeless as a result of addiction. Mr. Barclay graduated with a bachelor's of business administration from Belmont University and a master's degree in health services administration from the University of Saint Francis.
